

**Baptisms:** Our parish generally celebrates Baptisms on the Third Sunday of each month at the 10:30 AM Mass. Please contact the Parish Office for information regarding required instructional preparations. "Baptismal Names" can be a saint or biblical name, an expression of a Christian mystery or virtue, no name can be used which is foreign to the Christian mentality.

**Confirmation:** Confirmation is celebrated each year as scheduled by our Diocese. Candidates are expected to fulfill all Diocesan and Parish requirements in preparation

**Holy Eucharist:** First Communion is celebrated on the First Sunday of May. Please call the Parish Office to arrange for Holy Communion to be brought to shut-ins.

**Reconciliation:** Saturdays from 4:00 to 4:40 PM or by appointment.

**Anointing of the Sick:** For the seriously ill or injured OR those about to have surgery, please contact the Parish Office. Communal Anointing as arranged by the Pastoral Council.


Weddings: Weddings are to be scheduled at least six (6) months in advance and should precede any other arrangements for the wedding. All Wedding liturgies are scheduled so as not to conflict with regularly scheduled parish liturgies. All Diocesan directives and regulations for Marriage preparation (FOCCUS, Pre-Cana & Natural Family Planning) are required to be followed.

**Christian Initiation for Adults:** People desiring to become Catholic should contact the Parish Office before September of each year to begin the Christian Initiation Program which concludes at the Easter Vigil.

**Religious Education:** Public School Students from Grades 1 through 11, meet Sunday mornings from 9:00 AM to 10:20 AM in the school building.

**Catholic Education:** Our Parish is a supporting member of Holy Trinity Catholic School, grades Preschool through 5th grade, and Bishop Guilfoyle Catholic High School, grades 6th though 12th.

Parish Membership: Consists of Registration in the Parish Census, active participation at Mass on Sundays and Holy Days, worthy reception of the sacraments of Holy Communion and Reconciliation regularly, and financial support of our Parish.

### THE LAMB OF GOD

"Behold the Lamb of God!" We hear this phrase every Sunday at Mass, but there's a good chance that many Roman Catholics do not know who in the Bible originally spoke it. The phrase appears only in the Gospel of John, on the lips of John the Baptist, who utters it twice. In today's Gospel reading, John proclaims Jesus as the Lamb of God, and two of John's own disciples then follow Christ. A little bit later Andrew, who heard John and then followed Jesus, brings his brother Simon to be re-named Cephas, or Peter. A careful look at these Bible verses shows us the mission of everyone baptized into the Body of Christ: we must always proclaim our faith in Christ, so that others will follow him. We may not know how the will of God might work through those we bring to Christ; that is not the point. The point is that our ongoing mission as a church is to bring others to Christ, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world. Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co., Inc.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

"Ordinary Time" began for us this week. On the old calendar, the feast of the Presentation, still more than two weeks away, was the last day of the Christmas season. Sadly, Bethlehem is hardly a place of peace on earth these days. The ancient Christian community has been largely uprooted by political strife. The Church of the Nativity stands (barely) in remarkable disrepair and disorder in Manger Square. The roof is crumbling, the major doorways are blocked, the wiring is faulty, and the worship life is disrupted by quarrels among Eastern Christians.

The church was founded by the Emperor Constantine in 325, destroyed in a Samaritan revolt in 539, and rebuilt by the Emperor Justinian. When the area came under Muslim control in 638, the holiness of the church was respected, and in return Christians allowed Muslims to pray in the south aisle, a right still upheld. Earlier in that century, invading Persians were ordered to destroy all churches, but when they saw the magi carved over the doorway of the Church of the Nativity, they spared it out of respect for their ancestors who bore gold, frankincense, and myrrh to the same city. The Crusaders restored and redecorated the church by the twelfth century, and it is their plan that survives. Down a few stone steps is a stone grotto with a silver star marking the place of Christ's birth: when the star was stolen in 1847 it triggered an international crisis that exploded into the Crimean War.

Since 1852, the church has been shared by the Roman Catholic, Greek Orthodox, and Armenian Churches. The Greeks are in charge of the grotto, but don't enjoy the best of friendships with the Armenians. Catholics have the care of the Chapel of the Manger, and avoid the squabbles by a separate entrance to the Franciscan monastery church of St. Catherine. Pray for peace in Bethlehem!



The command to pray for Christian Unity comes from Jesus Himself in the Gospel of John during the last supper discourse. There, Jesus prays to the Father on behalf of his disciples who are with Him and all generations of disciples praying: 20 "I pray not only for them[the twelve apostles], but also for those who will believe in me through their word[Christians throughout the ages], 21 so that they may all be one, as you, Father, are in me and I in you, that they also may be in us, that the world may believe that you sent me. 22 And I have given them the glory you gave me, so that they may be one, as we are one, 23 I in them and you in me, that they may be brought to perfection as one, that the world may know that you sent me, and that you loved them even as you loved me" (Jn 17:20–23). Jesus' prayer that "all of us may be one" should be our prayer.

The path to unity begins in prayer and mutual good works. The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) has declared that this year our prayer should focus on the unity found in Christians coming together to do charitable works like the Good Samaritan. The Warming Shelter at Overflow Church which Alice Sturm discussed at mass a few weeks ago is a great example of Christians working together in our Altoona community. Joining the parish council comes with a commitment to meet once a month on Wednesday nights at 7pm.

As I said in a bulletin before the holidays: "at the New Pastor's Conference, I was reminded that it is important to have active parish councils and finance councils to receive greater input from parishioners to know how our parish can best serve the people in our pews and bring in more people! To do this I would like to find 3 new members for the parish council. The parish council is currently made up of four dedicated women of the parish. In order to have a well-rounded council with a diversity of backgrounds and opinions, I would like to extend an invitation to new families and men in the parish to prayerfully consider joining the parish council. Together we can come up with a great vision for growing our parish family and helping all of our parishioners to grow in their faith!"

Narthex HVAC System – The Finance Council and I have consulted bids for replacing the Narthex HVAC system and approved a bid. The cost of replacing the HVAC system in the Narthex and replacing the ceiling tiles will be a combined total of \$14,500.00. The majority of that expense is replacing the ceiling unit and replacing the ceiling track system for the ceiling tiles. There will be a trapdoor in the new ceiling tile grid for easier access to the ceiling unit for the regular maintenance of that new unit. The Second Collections for the foreseeable future will be designated for replacing the money used for this project which will be taken from the Fr. Kelley Hall Air Conditioning Project Funds.
